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Family Voice Bulletin 2.0 – Issue 16, (April 20th/2021) Future Planning: Wills, Henson Trust, & Powers of Attorney

Family group facilitators KJ Thomas, RSW, and Jillian Crabbe, RSW were joined by guest presenter Katrina Anders (lawyer) as she discussed special concerns regarding future and well-being of loved ones living with mental health challenges. Katrina discussed issues of caregivers, financial security, wills, Henson Trust, powers of attorney and other matters to be considered in planning future steps.

Many families in Canada have a member who lives with a serious mental illness. It is not uncommon in these cases for caregivers to think about, and make plans to assist their loved one both while they are alive, and after they pass. In Ontario, there are a number of financial assistance programs, benefits, and tax breaks that can help families to manage their income in ways that make the best sense for them and their loved one. These tools, while helpful, can be difficult to navigate, as well, guidelines and rules often change rapidly. For this reason, it is helpful and recommended to connect with an accountant, lawyer, and/or financial advisor to help guide you through the processes that will best suit your needs. When seeking information, use government websites for current practices, and if seeking a lawyer, it can be helpful to "shop around" as fees for services vary. As an estimate of a middle of the road cost today, a will, Power of Attorney and Henson Trust set up by a lawyer might be between \$1000-\$1500. All information in this bulletin is meant for general purposes only, as a guide for starting your process.

For caregivers looking to manage the assets for a person with a disability, these programs can help:

Provincial Disability Benefits- for qualifying people over the age of 18, includes financial, medical, and other benefits.

Disability Tax Credit- tax credits for persons who have a severe/prolonged impairment (12+ months)

Registered Disability Savings Plan- one account/beneficiary per person. Lifetime maximum \$200,000.

Canada Disability Savings Grant- a matching grant system of up to 300% depending on beneficiary's family income.

Child Disability Benefit- a tax-free benefit of up to \$224.58 per month for caregivers of children under 18 who live with a severe or prolonged illness

Canada Caregiver Credit-non-refundable tax credit that combines three previous credits: the caregiver credit, the family caregiver credit, and the credit for infirm dependants age 18 or older.

For those needing to manage an inheritance for a person with a disability, including financial realms, these programs are a good place to start:

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Henson Trust- optimal estate planning arrangement for persons living with a serious illness. There are Testamentary & Inter-vivos Henson Trusts.

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RRSP/RRIF Rollover-

Lifetime Benefit Trust-a lifetime benefit trust with respect to a taxpayer and the estate of a deceased individual if both meet particular conditions.

Pension & Insurance Products- There can be some issues in these areas, either commuting the pension into a lump sum and directing to a trust, or having pension income paid to a testamentary Henson trust can be another avenue to use these.

Power of Attorney- a legal document that you sign to give one, or more persons, the authority to manage your money and property on your behalf. In most of Canada, the person you appoint is called an "attorney." A POA was highly recommended by Katrina for all people. When choosing a POA, be sure it is someone you trust. They do not need to live in Ontario.

Lastly, for those who are needing to manage the care & assets of their loved one, you will want to explore Guardianship.

Guardianship- a formal plan of care and serving of plan (including alternative Guardian appointed), opportunity for review by The Ontario Office of the Public Guardian and Trustee, final applications are submitted by a lawyer to a judge.
